April 15th 3rd Sunday of Easter:

In C.S. Lewis's book Reflection on the Psalms, he notes that belief in the after-life is a late development in Judaism. The older parts of the Old Testament don't seem to know of any after-life at all. Here is Lewis's comment:

As we all know from our New Testaments, Judaism had greatly changed in [respect to its belief in an afterlife] by Our Lord's time. The Sadducees held to the old view. The Pharisees, and apparently many more, believed in the life of the world to come. When, and by what stages, and (under God) from what sources, this new belief crept in, is not part of our present subject. I am more concerned to try to understand the absence of such a belief, in the midst of intense religious feeling, over the earlier period. To some it may seem astonishing that God, having revealed so much of Himself to that people, should not have taught them this.

It does not now astonish me. For one thing there were nations close to the Jews whose religion was overwhelmingly concerned with the afterlife. In reading about ancient Egypt one gets the impression of a culture in which the main business of life was the attempt to secure the well-being of the dead. It looks as if God did not want the chosen people to follow that example. We may ask why. Is it possible for me to be too much concerned with their eternal destiny? In one sense, paradoxical enough, I should reply, Yes.

For the truth seems to me to be that happiness or misery beyond death, simply in themselves, are not ever religious subjects at all. A man who believes in them will of course be prudent to seek the one and avoid the other. But that seems to have no more to do with religion than looking after one's health or saving money for one's old age. The only difference here is that the stakes are so very much higher. And this means that, granted a real and steady conviction, the hopes and anxieties aroused are overwhelming. But they are not on that account the more religious. They are hopes for oneself, anxieties for oneself. God is not the centre. He is still important only for the sake of something else. Indeed such a belief can exist without a belief in God at all. Buddhists are much concerned with what will happen to them after death, but are not, in any true sense, Theists.

It is surely, therefore, very possible that when God began to reveal Himself to men, to show them that He and nothing else is their true goal and the satisfaction of all their needs, and that He has a claim upon them simply by being what He is, quite apart from anything He can bestow or deny, it may have been absolutely necessary that this revelation should not begin with any hint of future Beatitude or Perdition. These are not the right points to begin at. An effective belief in them, coming too soon, may even render almost impossible the development of (so to call it) the appetite for God; personal hopes and fears, too obviously exciting, have got in first. Later, when, after centuries of spiritual training, men have learned to desire and adore God, to pant after Him "as pants the hart", it is another matter. For then those who love God will desire not only to enjoy Him but "to enjoy Him forever", and will fear to lose Him. And it is by that door that a truly religious hope of Heaven and fear of Hell can enter...

Dear Parishioners of Ste Rose, Laurier and McCreary

1. AGM. Another reminder that Ste Rose's Annual General Meeting is this Thursday the 19th at 7pm. Please come join us.

2. Synod. Earlier in the year I notified you of the 42 propositions that came out of the Synod assemblies this winter. Forty-two is a lot to handle, so the Synod steering committee condensed the Forty-two to Fourteen. These are those fourteen:

The Archdiocese of Winnipeg proposes that: (1) We undertake appropriate initiatives intended for all people in parishes, deaneries, and other levels of the church, to proclaim the Gospel message and invite all to follow Jesus as his disciples. (2) We support the vocation of marriage and assist families in making their homes domestic churches by living out their faith and communicating it to others, especially their children. (3) We raise awareness of our responsibility to assist and advocate for the most vulnerable in our society. (4) We formulate a formation program for young people. (5) We nurture a right and respectful relationship between indigenous and non-indigenous people. (6) Parish communities provide opportunities to discern social issues and environmental issues so as to responsibly take up our mission to the world. (7) We develop opportunities for prayer and devotional life within our Catholic community. (8) Our parishes seek to respond in love to the various forms of family life present in their communities. (9) We encourage all the baptized to acquire a familiarity with Sacred Scripture. (10) We focus on the ongoing formation of laity as missionary disciples in the service of the Church and the world. (11) We provide on-going training for clergy and lay leaders to equip them to provide formation for the people they serve. (12) We seek to be a Church that accompanies others in mercy by being welcoming, listening to and understanding their life stories. (13) Our parishes develop opportunities for youth and young adults for involvement and leadership in the life of the Church and engagement in the service of others. (14) We develop a synodal approach to governance and pastoral ministry at and between all levels of the Archdiocesan Church.

3. Thanks to all who assisted in preparations for Holy Week and Easter! Our high holy days would not run as smoothly and beautifully as they do without the help of many people behind the scenes, preparing music, decorating the church, organizing ministries, and so on. I'm grateful to you all.
