Children are a Blessing

God places a very high value on children and encourages us to bring them into our lives. This is a Christian viewpoint greatly at variance with today's anti-child, anti-life sentiments:

*Behold, children are a blessing from the Lord. The fruit of the womb is a reward.
Like arrows in the hand of a warrior, so are the children of one's youth.*

-Psalm 127:3

September 3rd, 22nd Sunday of Ordinary Time:

In the beginning [Jesus does not mention his own] death. Had the people been open, the predictions of the prophets would have fulfilled themselves, and salvation would have been brought about bloodlessly, through gospel and faith. The face of history would have been completely different. As long as this possibility existed, Jesus seems not to have spoken of his own dying, or at least only in uncertain and tentative terms. But when the leaders hardened their hearts, and the masses failed him, Jesus turned—we do not know in which darkest hour—down the other road to world salvation: the road to Golgotha.

Now in the hour of Caesarea Philippi he speaks openly of dying, “But who do you say that I am?” After Peter has replied and the Lord has praised him come the words: “From that time Jesus began to show his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem and suffer many things from the elders and Scribes and chief priests, and be put to death, and on the third day rise again” (Matt. 16:21; 17; 20). How terrible this decision was, how much, in spite of the power of his will, his whole being revolted from death’s strangeness and horror, is revealed by what follows the announcement, when Peter takes him aside and remonstrates with him: “Far be it from thee, O Lord; this will never happen to thee.”

Jesus turns on him: “Get behind me, satan, thou art a scandal to me; for thou dost not mind the things of God, but those of men” (Matt. 16:22–23). Also at this time fall the heavy words about the grain of wheat that must sink into the ground and die, if it is not to remain barren (John 12:24) and the call of readiness for death: “But I have a baptism to be baptized with; and how distressed I am until it is accomplished!” (Luke 12:50). Lazarus’ resurrection is also of this period. But always, reference to Jesus’ own death is linked with resurrection, Good Friday with Easter Sunday.

From this alone it is clear that the death which Jesus dies is not, like ours, the destructive death of sin, but a death which he who is Lord of death voluntarily accepts from the hand of his Father: “For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life that I may take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of myself. I have the power to lay it down, and I have the power to take it up again” (John 10:17–18).

It is on the road to Jerusalem too that the mysterious interlude of the Transfiguration takes place: premonition of that which is to fulfill itself at Easter projected into the living moment. The dying of the Lord is always linked with the Transfiguration, for he dies in the abundance of life, not in weakness or decline.

This is also apparent the last night in the Garden of Olives, where the full horror of his end breaks over him. Fearful unto death, he nevertheless surrenders his will to the Father’s. Christ the uncontaminated receives death only from the will of the Father, accepted in perfect freedom. For this reason he “drank of death” more deeply than we ever could. We submit to death by force: he willed it in the ultimate intimacy of love. That is why his dying was so difficult. It has been claimed that others have died worse deaths than Jesus Christ. This is not true. The purer, stronger the life that death overcomes, the more terrible the dying. Our life is always so corrupted by death, that we have no idea what real, whole life is. Jesus was so entirely vital that he could say: *I am* life; thus he alone could drain death to the dregs and still prevail against it.

Dear Parishioners of Ste. Rose, Laurier and McCreary,

1. Regarding Sharing God's Gifts Appeal 2017

This year the Archdiocese has restructured its finances. In this restructuring the targets for the Parish Appeal, which is commonly known as *Sharing God's Gifts*, have been reduced.

Our targets for SGG this year 2017 are as follows: Ste. Rose \$8,420 Laurier \$2,410 McCreary \$1,890 While our *Appeal (SGG)* targets have been reduced, our Parish *Assessments* (the Archdiocesan tax) have been increased to 16% of our Sunday Collections from the previous year. Thus we will be assessed as follows: Ste Rose \$13,220, Laurier \$3,780, McCreary \$2,970

It would be to our advantage to think of these Assessment amounts as belonging also to our *Sharing God's Gifts* targets. Given this, the following would be our targets: **Ste Rose \$21,640 Laurier \$6,190 McCreary \$4,860**

Please note that any funds we collect over our SGG targets will be returned to our parishes untaxed. Thus, for instance, if Ste Rose collected \$22 000, \$13 580 (= 22000 – 8420) would be returned to our parish (and could be used for paying the Assessment).

Please pray about giving of your wealth according to the Stewardship model: 90% your needs 5% your Parish 3% other charities 2% Sharing God's Gifts.

2. Regarding the Ste Rose Roof

We have hired a contractor to replace the flat roof over the church foyer and offices.

The work is scheduled to begin Tuesday September 5th, though that date may be subject to change. **While the work is ongoing we intend to cancel weekday Masses.**

We'd like to thank all those who have contributed to the Roof Fund, and in particular The Rainy Day Club, which is contributing \$60 000 to this project. These gifts will considerably lighten the financial strain on our parish. Yet much money still needs to be raised! Please help if you can.
