Next Jesus calls us to go beyond obligation and duty when referring to the Apostles as "worthless slaves" for having done "only what they ought to have done!" God is much more interested in why we do what we do rather than what we do. When we serve and give out of love for God and one another we move from obligation and duty to what Jesus is looking for.
